

Older Americans Act (OAA)

Enacted by Congress in 1965

• Title I – Declaration of Objectives

Title II – established the U.S. Administration on Aging (AoA) and state agencies on aging to address the social services needs of older adults

AoA is now under the Administration of Community Living (ACL)

Mission is to help older adults maintain maximum independence

Also covers caregiver support, emergency planning, and evidence-based programming

Older Coloradans Act

Also known as "Volume 10"

State legislation that authorizes and guides use of OAA

Advisory councils mandated as part of OCA

- SUA drafts and submits a State Area Plan which is submitted to ACL



Subpopulation: LGBTQ+ Older Adults




Older LGBTQ+ adults experience challenges accessing inclusive, gender-affirming health care and social care.

LGBTQ+ folks are, on average, poorer and have fewer financial resources than their heterosexual counterparts.

LGBTQ+ caregivers may face limits in their ability to provide care over the long-term, especially if decision-making is required for the care recipient.

Social isolation is more prevalent for LGBTQ+ older adults than for the general older adult population.



One in four (26%) older adults in our community report being treated unfairly or discriminated against because of their age.

Ageism sustains inequality between age groups, and has been shown to cause cardiovascular stress, lowered level of self-efficacy and decreased productivity.

Ageism ingrained in our society can become self-fulfilling by promoting stereotypes of decline, social isolation, lack of physical activity, and economic burden.

Ageism exists in our community.



THE Strategic Plan
