EXAMPLES OF ORDINANCES

CITY OF BOULDER ORDINANCE NO. 8045

WHEREAS, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOULDER, COLORADO, FINDS AND RECITES THE FOLLOWING: The city, through its policies, programs, and laws, supports efforts to reduce the amount of waste that must be disposed of in landfills and pursues "zero waste" as a long-term goal by emphasizing waste prevention efforts

- 6-3-3. Accumulation of Trash, Recyclables, and Compostables Prohibited.
- 6-3-9. Special Trash Service Requirements on Certain Residential Rental Properties at Certain Times.
- 6-3-13. Property Owner Requirements for Recyclables and Compostables Collection.
- 6-3-14. Business Owner Requirements for Recyclables and Compostables Collection.
- 6-3-15. Special Events Requirements for Recyclables and Compostables Collection.

TOWN OF FRISCO COUNTY OF SUMMIT STATE OF COLORADO ORDINANCE 22 - 04

WHEREAS, in August of 2005, the Summit County Board of County Commissioners approved Resolution No. 2005-64 to establish a zero waste goal through the promotion of reduced consumption, reuse of materials and increased recycling until the concept of a landfill is obsolete

- § 124-26. Hauler licensing and reporting requirements.
- § 124-27. Hauler service requirements. (residential & commercial)
- § 124-28. Residential Customer and Commercial Customer Requirements.
- § 124-29. Violations and Penalties.



Ordinance language was drafted through intergovernmental collaboration between Frisco, Dillon, Breckenridge, and unincorporated Summit County for easier adoption and provides opportunity for modification.



Meeting Ordinance Requirements

1 Understand Ordinance Requirements

The city's Universal Zero Waste Ordinance requires all properties in Boulder to have waste services that provide separated compost, recycling and trash.

l businesses must:


- Clear explanation of Ordinance Requirements and Exemptions
- Signage guidance and downloadable collateral
- Listing of hauler services
- Training materials for employees
- Education materials
- Staffing to answer questions:
 - Onsite bin placement guidance
 - Cart or bin size estimations

Optional considerations:

- Tiered approach based on waste generation
- Rebate options to offset initial costs

HAULER INTERVIEWS



Engage one-on-one (1:1) informational interviews to gather feedback and input regarding various policy options, ability to comply with updated policies, and how policies will impact their businesses.

Common talking points:

- Capacity for increased hauling; trucks, labor, routes
- Existing contracts with Businesses, HOAs and MFCs
- Position on 'preferred hauler' or single-hauler approach
- Approaches to reduce contamination
- Timeline to allow bidding and implementation of program



COMMERCIAL SECTOR ENGAGEMENT

- Assistance with bin placement & physical space constraints
- Worker impact; additional time and labor expense, training, administration
- Voluntary programs (PACE for Green Biz, Certifiably Green Denver, Ft. Collins & Lakewood MFC starter program)
- Financial incentives
- **Enforcement & penalties**
- Contamination fees (sometimes from illegal dumping)
- Event permitting to include recycling and composting
- Demolition permits that require minimum recycled content

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

Suggested approaches:

- → Peer to Peer Engagement
- → Community Presentations and Activities
- → Tabling at Events
- → Open House
- → Public Meetings with City Leadership
- → Community Survey
- → Residential Focus Groups

ENFORCEMENT

- 1. Compliance reporting: Reliance on self-reporting and addressing complaint-based inquiries.
- 2. Inspections: to ensure businesses are complying with recycling requirements. Inspectors can check to see if the business has recycling bins available, if the bins are labeled correctly, and if the bins are being used properly.
- 3. Education and outreach: to help businesses understand recycling requirements and how to comply. This can include providing informational materials, workshops, and training sessions.
- 4. Rewards and incentives: can include recognition programs, tax incentives, or other benefits.
- 5. Fines: for failure to comply with recycling requirements. Fines can be a powerful incentive for businesses to comply, as they can be costly and can add up over time.
- 6. Revocation of permits or licenses: In extreme cases, local governments can revoke permits or licenses for businesses that consistently fail to comply with recycling requirements. This can be a last resort, but it can be an effective way to ensure compliance.



WASTE REDUCTION REBATES & INCENTIVES

Partners for a Clean Environment (PACE)

helps businesses in all Boulder County communities improve their business practices in the areas of energy efficiency, **waste reduction**, water conservation and quality and alternative transportation.

Available Rebates and Incentives

PACE incentives are available on a first come, first serve basis. Businesses are required to contact an advisor to confirm funding availability, ensure that your project meets the eligibility requirements.

Up To \$1,000 Incentive Towards Reusable Solutions (City of Lafayette Only)

The City of Lafayette is committed to supporting businesses transitioning from single-use items to reusable solutions. To help small businesses cover some of the costs, the City of Lafayette and PACE is offering a one-time incentive toward purchasing reusable solutions (only while funds last). Incentives can cover up to 50% of total project costs and will not exceed \$1,000. Fill in the application form here. Examples of items funded include but are not limited to:

- Durables dishware
- Reusable takeout containers
- Dishwashers

WASTE REDUCTION PROGRAMS LOUISVILLE (COMING SOON)

City of Louisville: Bag tax funded commercial waste reduction programs

- Hard to recycle six month subscription to biweekly pickup service (up to \$500)
- Incentive to start a commercial recycling collection (\$500 + existing \$150 PACE incentive). Requires a one year commitment.
- Reusable restaurant takeout container pilot: 3 months of program participation includes container purchase, stocking/cleaning, customer subsidy (\$500 value)
- Zero Waste Grant: \$500 towards project that promotes reusable products or reduces waste



ZERO WASTE BUSINESS REBATE

The **City of Austin** has a Zero Waste Business Rebate as an incentive for businesses to improve their waste reduction and diversion practices. Eligible businesses can receive up to \$3,000 for reducing waste beyond the minimum requirements of the Universal Recycling Ordinance.

Eligible Rebates:


- Promote shared use diversion containers between multiple affected premises (up to \$1,800)
- Provide indoor recycling bins to residents at multifamily properties (up to \$1,800)
- Expand food donation programs to people or to a charitable food organization (up to \$3k)
- Ditch single-use plastic and foam items for reusable and compostable options (up to \$1,800)
- Start or expand your compost program at your property or business (up to \$3K)
- Increase recycling options (HtR) for employees or residents at your business (up to \$1,800)
