

Boulder County Survey Key Findings April 2024

Methodology

New Bridge Strategy conducted a survey among N=500 voters throughout Boulder County from April 24-30, 2024. Interviews were conducted via live telephone interviews (both cell phones and landlines) and online. Interviews were distributed proportionally throughout the county. Quotas were set for key demographic sub-groups, such as gender and age.

The survey was also translated into Spanish and respondents had the option of taking the survey in either English or Spanish.

The margin of error is \pm 4.38% for the overall sample. The margin of error will vary for sub-groups.




Views of the County

Views of the County are up slightly (within margin of error) from last year, with a few more saying Boulder County is headed in the right direction.



Generally speaking, would you say things in Boulder County are going in the right direction, or do you feel things here have pretty seriously gotten off on the wrong track in the past few years?

Over one-quarter of voters say the most important problem facing Boulder County is housing, followed by traffic and over-development. This is fairly consistent with last year's data.


What would you say is the single MOST important problem facing Boulder County?

Most voters say taxes are about right or high, but acceptable. However, over a third say they are way too high.





Voters who think the county is on the wrong track are much more likely to say taxes are too high.





Potential Ballot Question to Fund Mental Health Services

The lower tax increase amount does not reach the 50 percent "yes" threshold.

Shall Boulder County property taxes be increased by **\$11,489,649 through an increase in the property tax mill levy of one mill, which would increase taxes by \$6 per \$100,000 in property value**, for the purpose of providing early intervention and treatment that addresses mental health and substance use disorders to increase community wellness for youth, families, and adults?



However, the lower amount performs better than the \$22M amount we tested, which receives almost a majority saying they would vote "no."




We combined the two variations of the proposal to have greater confidence in sub-groups. Younger voters are more likely to support the proposal; older men are least supportive.











Convincing

These support statements are not quite as compelling to voters, but still receive at least almost a bare majority saying they are convincing.

There is currently a shortage of mental health providers in our community, leading to long waits % Very 27% for mental health services. Investments in recruiting and retaining mental health professionals 62% Convincing will increase the availability of mental health care in the county. By investing in treatment for problems with use of substances such as alcohol and non-23% prescription drugs, we can help reduce people's suffering while also reducing the burden on our 63% criminal justice system and homeless services. Our community has experienced extreme levels of stress due to COVID, disasters, gun violence, 49% 16% inflation, and other factors, which have increased the need for mental health services.















The "in perpetuity" language hovers in the mid-30's across all gender and age groups.




Potential Worth Cause Sales and Use Tax Ballot Questions







Regardless of gender and age, voters are unlikely to support this proposal.






Even Independents and Democrats oppose this proposal, though one-third of Democrats are undecided.








Potential Real Estate Transfer Tax Ballot Question











Potential Land Restoration Fund


About one-in-three say they would contribute to a land transfer fee restoration fund, but more say they wouldn't contribute.









The Bottom Line

The Bottom Line

- As we are seeing across the state in other Colorado communities, voters continue to feel more negatively than positively towards the direction that Boulder County is headed in. Housing and traffic/over-development are viewed as the most important problems facing the County. 35 percent say that taxes in the County are way too high, which could be fueling some of the anti-tax sentiment we see in this survey.
- The potential property tax increase to fund mental health services in the County does not reach a majority saying they would vote yes, regardless of the amount tested (\$11M or \$22M). After hearing about items that this proposal would potentially fund as well as support and opposition statements, the lower amount does reach bare majority support, but 37 percent of voters still say they would vote no on the measure. The mental health items that this measure would fund are all deemed to be extremely or very important by at least 48 percent of voters. Three of the messages in support of the measures we tested, including messages about Boulder youth, keeping residents out of the criminal justice system, and Colorado's low ratings for mental health are very compelling to voters. However, this information is not enough to overcome tax sensitivity in the County.
- The potential Worthy Cause Sales and Use Tax ballot question also does not reach that critical 50-percent yes threshold. The language that does not include extending the measure in perpetuity performs better, but one-in-three still say they would vote no and almost one-in-four say they are undecided.
- A majority say they would vote no on the potential roads measure. However, support for this measure increases slightly, but only to 30 percent vote yes, once voters hear more about the personal financial impact of the measure. Those who would be impacted by the road improvements are most likely to vote yes, but a majority still is not in support here.

The Bottom Line

- Off the bat, voters are split on the real estate transfer tax proposal, with a few more saying they would be likely to oppose the measure. Of those who oppose the proposal, they are most concerned about instituting the tax versus funding the purchase and return of the land. 34 percent say they would be likely to contribute to the land transfer restoration fund. However, almost half say they aren't likely to contribute.
- In conclusion, Boulder voters, like voters across the state, are currently very tax sensitive. They do not want to see their taxes increased, even if they do view the purposes of the taxes we tested as important.



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
